


### FIREFIGHTER TRAINING

#### **Honoring the Fallen Firefighter**

 When a fire department experiences a line-of-duty death and/or injury, personnel should be trained to provide the best possible support to the firefighter's family. Fire departments should have administrative and operational procedures in place to handle the immediate and long-term needs of the bereaved.

#### **HazMat Awareness, Part 2 of 8**

 737-0202 / 30 min

This HazMat awareness course is based on curriculum from IFSTA and the University of Kansas Fire Service Training division. It complies with all required dimensions of the OSHA and EPA. In part two of our series, we discuss the different types of hazardous materials and the ways humans can be exposed to harmful substances. We examine possible ignition sources and share clues that first responders should look for during any routine call. We also continue to review the placards that you might encounter on a daily basis.

#### **Self-Assessment**

The purpose of this course is to promote the concept of self-assessment to determine whether a fire department is taking all of the appropriate steps to prevent line-of-duty deaths. Inherent and environmental risk factors for firefighters, increasing work environment safety, and self-assessment are all discussed.

#### **Command Transfer: Leadership on the Edge**

Succession planning and career development are two major issues facing today's fire service. In this series, Command Transfer addresses these issues with continuing lessons that focus on preparing future fire officers for increasing levels of command responsibility. In this course, Chief Ron Coleman welcomes special guest Mark Revere to discuss the risks, roles, and responsibilities of individuals who are working in leadership roles, such as organizational leadership, departmental leadership, or conceptual leadership.

#### **Incident Command**

How does the incident command structure help manage a firefighting operation? How SHOULD it work? We'll look at incident command from the bottom up and from the perspective of the front-line responder. We'll study how the chain of command on the fireground impacts all on the scene, and you'll see that everyone is a crucial link in that chain.

#### **American Heat: Bus Rescue**

 Each year in the United States, approximately 9,500 injuries occur to school bus occupants. Approximately 50 commercial bus riders are injured. The vast majority of the time, buses travel without accident; however, when a bus-related accident does occur, local responders may be confronted with a major multi-casualty incident for which they are not prepared.

#### **American Heat: GIS: Providing the Foundation for Real-Time Intelligence, Part 2**

GIS is a critical component of a sustainable planning process to establish terrorist prevention and mitigation strategies, effective response capability, expedient recovery, and an analysis of potential threats. This course examines technological solutions that make GIS applications readily available in times of disaster and explains how GIS applications play a vital role in disaster mitigation.

#### **American Heat: Hepatitis C**

The wife of one dying firefighter said it best: "Hepatitis C is a hero's disease, and it must be fought with a hero's response." This course will take you beyond the dry facts and figures of your typical EMS CE program because hepatitis C is not about facts and figures; it's about people. Bob Flamily is one of those people. Until he retired with a still-undiagnosed illness, Bob had spent 20 years with the Orlando Fire Department. He began his career during the era when responders didn't even wear gloves. Today, he is

battling not only the disease but also the system that many feel has turned its back on him. We spent several days in Orlando and captured Bob's story for a very important reason: he will likely be gone by the time you watch this course. #### **American Heat: Marina Fires**

Think you don't need to watch a program about marina fires? Think again. This show doesn't just apply to coastal fire departments, but any department located near water. That means streams, rivers, lakes, or oceans. There are unique challenges that fire departments face in a marina fire. This edition of American Heat will take a close look at those challenges and show fire departments how to combat them. The course will also show viewers how fireboats can play a critical role in fighting such fires.

#### **PULSE: Child Abuse Identification**

 The identification of child abuse is everyone's responsibility, but first responders have special legal responsibilities when it comes to identifying and reported suspected abuse. This course equips first responders with information to be able to identify the behavioral and physical signs and symptoms of an abusive situation. It provides information on the EMT's responsibilities as a mandated reporter, and it provides clear guidelines on how to properly report suspected abuse.

#### **Chest and Abdominal Trauma**

 This edition of PULSE provides an extensive review of chest and abdominal anatomy and physiology. Students will learn how to assess and manage a variety of chest and abdominal injuries. The issues of fluid resuscitation and chest decompression techniques are also highlighted.
