#### **Weapons of Mass Destruction: Decontamination**

This course will illustrate the Montgomery County Decontamination System and how the system will support both field and hospital applications as adopted by Montgomery County and the South Pennsylvania Terrorism Task Force. Their example can be adapted and applied in most regions.



#### **HazMat Awareness, Part 4 of 8: Facility, Transportation, and Placard Identification**

Hazardous materials awareness is required of every responder every year. This series will meet those OSHA and EPA requirements. The series consists of the video programs (also available in your choice of VHS, DVD, or CD-ROM) with lesson plans and tests to measure the student learning. Be sure that your department trains on every segment of this national-level training.



#### **Making the Right Call: Avoiding LODD**

For the American firefighter, the ability to quickly and thoroughly evaluate the right course of action during the confusion of a fire is a critical skill that can mean the difference between life and death. Making the right call based on the available cues requires a thorough understanding of “situational awareness.” Situational awareness is staying aware of the situation you are in—keeping your wits about you when surrounded by fire, noise, crashes, screams, and more. The true mark of a seasoned professional is the ability to take these cues and not only predict but also evaluate multiple courses of action and their consequences. Join us as we explore how to boost your situational awareness skills to the level of the expert.



#### **Safety, Security, and Protection of the Firehouse**

This course discusses an important topic: protecting the firehouse. We demonstrate firehouse security and safety techniques that you will need to know.

#### **Utility Control**

463-0507 / 30 min

The utility control program contains information about electrical, gas, and water emergencies and how to mitigate them. Each of these emergencies is unique, but many of the tactics to be considered by command are quite common. The course topics include stand-alone utility emergencies, as well as how utilities affect a structure fire response.



#### **American Heat: Wildfires**

This course is intended to acquaint students with the basics of wildland firefighting. For some, it will simply be an important review of things they already know. For others, it may be the first time that they have ever been introduced to these important safety tips that have the potential to save the life of a firefighter.



#### **American Heat: Fire on Trial**

Firefighters may be called to testify in any number of legal issues, from arson to domestic violence. In this program, we will explore the steps a first responder should take to ensure that their contribution to the justice system is as thorough as possible. We will also look at some techniques firefighters can use to gather as much information when arriving on the scene of an incident without compromising their safety or job performance.



#### **Heat, Heart, and Health**

463-0902 / 60 min

Your job is to take care of others, but are you also taking care of yourself? Firefighters are ordinary people doing an extraordinary job, and it's up to you to meet the demands of your profession. In this edition of American Heat, we visit Las Vegas and Phoenix to find out how members from these two departments keep their well-being in check, especially during the summer months. You will also hear the story of a Phoenix firefighter who momentarily became a heart attack statistic but is now getting a second chance at life. From on-scene rehab to preventing heart problems, you will see how focusing on wellness can save lives ... the lives of your own.



#### **Manufactured Housing**

A manufactured home can deal responders a mixed bag of fire hazards. Although new factory homes are federally regulated for safety, older models are still around, they are still catching on fire, and they still burn fast. In this edition of American Heat, you hear from two departments who know the devastation these structure fires can producer- inside and out. In Oklahoma, a department lost 22 manufactured homes in one day as a result of a wildland fire. A year later, a Pennsylvania department lost one of their own inside a manufactured home structure fire. Both incidents show how manufactured housing fires can threaten a department's firefighting efforts and life safety.

#### **High-Risk Obstetrics**

464-0507 / 30 min

There are few calls that EMTs respond to that are as memorable and satisfying as delivering a healthy baby. First responders often do this in a less than ideal environment: in the middle of the night at the mother's home, in the back of a cramped ambulance, or on a city bus. Fortunately for EMTs, most of the time all goes well despite the prehospital conditions. However, when things go badly with the mother or baby, the actions that we take can be life-saving for both the mother and baby. There is no such thing as a “routine” prehospital childbirth. This course provides EMTs with a basic refresher on reproductive anatomy. Also discussed are conditions that place the woman and baby at high risk for complications, guidelines for conducting a patient assessment, and a basic demonstration of how to deliver a baby.



#### **PULSE: Constant Threats: Terrorism and Disasters**

464-0505 / 60 min

This course is a review of the most current issues pertinent to EMS in terms of terrorism and disaster-related issues. Highlights include a review of the TOPOFF exercises and an introductory overview of the National Response Plan and Critical Infrastructure Protections Issues for EMS.
