A+	Firefighter Training	Fireground Safety and Survival	038-0807	30 minute video plus course materials	Safety and survival-what do you think of when you hear this phrase? To many, it has very little meaning. To others, it means training. To a chief, it means policies. There are as many safety and survival issues to deal with as there are types of responses. The problem with this is no two responses are ever exactly alike in every aspect. The one key area that people concern themselves with is returning from each alarm safely.
A+	Firefighter Training	Special Teams: Introduction to Ice Rescue	038-0306	30 minute video plus course materials	Ice rescue incidents pose special hazards to the responding personnel. If fire personnel are not aware of the potential hazards, they could easily become victims themselves. Understanding the limits and capabilities of responding personnel can result in a successful ice rescue and ensure that the rescuers are not harmed. Part 1 of a two-part series, this course discusses incident planning, tactical operations and safety concerns for rescue personnel at an ice-involved incident. Types of ice formations and the characteristics and potential hazards of ice are described. In addition, this course provides an overview of the signs and symptoms of hypothermia and its treatment.

This course looks at proper assignments and equipment for a ladder company and discusses tactics used at single-family, multiple-occupancy dwellings. It also covers tactics used at high-rise and commercial buildings.
A+	Firefighter Training	Forcible Entry, Part 1: Introduction	038-3001	30 minute video plus course materials	Forcible entry is a skill that many firefighters lose proficiency in due to limited opportunities to review and practice. This course reviews the basic theory involving forcible entry tools as well as window, door and lock construction. Part one of this "Forcible Entry" training course is a solid review of the targets and equipment required to safely and effectively carry out forcible entry operations on the fireground.
A+	Firefighter Training	Ventilation	038-0108	30 minute video plus course materials	Many firefighter injuries and deaths are attributed to extreme fire behavior. Arriving firefighters many times find the fire is in a ventilation controlled phase. In a ventilation controlled phase, the fire is poised to change rapidly. This course discusses why proper ventilation is more important than ever on todays fireground and describes the steps to perform proper ventilation.
A+	American Heat	Hoseline Tactics	463-1107	60 minute video plus course materials	The purpose of this course is to identify common practices, hoseline selection, hazards, and inherent difficulties encountered by fire attack teams in residential structure fires. The course also examines some reasonable and practical options that can increase hose team success and increase firefighter safety when faced with this challenge.

Certain historical fires are benchmarks in development of the current system, and knowledge of these events is critical to understanding the evolution of the fire service system. By evaluating fires and using them as educational examples, we gain valuable knowledge about fire prevention, safety, and the continuing need for change.

Also, firefighters at the Clark County (NV) Fire Department recap what happened when a large grassfire threatened several homes and they had no access to fire hydrants.

A+	PULSE	PULSE: Hidden Hemorrhagic Shock and Trauma	464-0707	30 minute video plus course materials	This course discusses the causes, signs, and symptoms of hidden hemorrhagic shock. Pre-hospital basic life support (BLS) treatment of hidden hemorrhagic shock for the basic EMS provider is also discussed.
A+	PULSE	PULSE: Traumatic Brain Injury	464-0907	30 minute video plus course materials	The majority of brain injuries result from auto accidents, sports injuries, falls, and physical assaults. Since emergency personnel are first responders to people with head injuries, EMS personnel need to be able to properly recognize and assess the signs of a traumatic brain injury. Early recognition and treatment of an extreme brain injury could reduce immediate trauma and future complications. In order to adequately understand traumatic head injury, we review normal anatomy and physiology of the nervous system. We look at common brain injury findings after a traumatic event in order to identify basic life support assessment and treatment modalities. EMS personnel also learn how to recognize what it means for the victim to cope with a traumatic brain injury.
